Results and experiences from SDF's living experience groups

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WHAT IS LIVING EXPERIENCE ?

Living experience is direct experience of living with a drug problem. This may include people who are currently using drugs and/or people who are accessing Medication Assisted Treatment or other forms of treatment and support.

People who are currently using drugs or accessing treatment may hold different attitudes and opinions from people in long term abstinent recovery

LIVING EXPERIENCE GROUPS

Aim: To ensure that the voice of living experience of the 60,000 people experiencing drug problems is developed and enhanced in Scotland to inform and influence service development and delivery across Scotland at both local and national levels.

Current groups cover:

Glasgow/ East Dunbartonshire, West Dunbartonshire, Borders, North Lanarkshire, South Lanarkshire, Fife, East Ayrshire, Perth, Argyll and Bute, Highland, Edinburgh


There are 100+ people attending the 11 groups, approx. 70% male/30% female, Most attendees have a long history of drug/alcohol use 10 years +

National group:

Representatives across groups come together 3-4 times a year Involved in the national collaborative 'charter of rights'


• Group members engage in a phone interview and harm reduction intervention covering:

> Drug tested i.e. street benzos etc, the first part of the postcode substance was used in, and (if different) where the drug was purchased from, how much was paid, appearance/smell of drug > If they went on to take the substance. If yes, if they made any changes to their use e.g. took less and what were the effects they experienced, any unexpected effects or differences observed to

> Staff encourage the tester to submit any remainders of substance to WEDINOS for confirmatory testing, reiterate harm reduction messages and advice around naloxone administration for



96 Samples sent since June 2022



69% street benzos (n=66) Of the 49 returned to date: etizolam (n=25), bromozolam (n=17), clonazolam (n=3)



6 heroin heroin (n=3), nitazene (n=1) unable to test (n=2)



3 gabapentinoids gabapentin (n=1), diazepam (n=1), awaiting results (n=1)



12 Xanax: Bromozolam (n=5), alprazolam (n=2) not able to be tested (n=5)





27 of 37 street benzos returned bromazolam (n=13), etizolam (n=9)







TESTING STRIPS PILOT



- people
- 181 strips given out so far
- testing, 2 awaiting results)

 Training on nitazene awareness, overdose prevention and harm reduction/use of testing strips delivered to 241

• 3 positive results so far (1 false positive on confirmatory)

CONCLUSIONS AND REFLECTIONS



- analysis services e.g. WEDINOS
- contact with treatment services)

• Real time information to allow people to make more informed decisions- engages people in utilising wider
