




### Scottish Government vs Scottish Parliament

What's the difference??

### **The Parliament**



- Are <u>all</u> the MSPs
- Scrutinise and <u>pass</u> (or not) each law
- Hold the government to account for:
  - how the laws are working
  - how the Annual Budget is spent

### The Government:



- Are some MSPs
- Propose most laws
- Implement the laws
- Create the budget
- Spend the money



### What a Parliamentary Committee does

- Currently 15 Committees themed to devolved issues and Cabinets
- Smaller groups of MSPs from different parties
- Key role in law-making and postlegislative scrutiny
- Key role in scrutinising the Government





## Joint Committee on Reducing drug deaths in Scotland and tackling problem drug use

- The Criminal Justice Committee, Health, Social Care and Sport Committee and Social Justice and Social Security Committee are working together
- Considering the progress made on the implementation of the recommendations of the Scottish Drug Deaths Taskforce.
- Meet around once every 6 months...





### People's Panel

- ... to maximise impact and give public a voice in scrutiny the Committees commissioned a People's Panel.
- What does Scotland need to do differently to reduce drug related harms?'
- The people's panel met over two weekends – on October 25 to 27 and November 15 to 17 and two online sessions on 6 and 12 November







## What is a People's Panel?





20 to 25 randomly selected citizens




They get to hear and question expert witnesses



They debate, deliberate, and make informed recommendations



### **Process**



### How did we recruit the People's Panel?

- •Invitation Process: 5,000 households across Scotland received letters from committee conveners inviting them to register interest in joining a People's Panel on drug-related issues.
- •Selection & Support: From 205 responses (4.1% rate), a demographically representative group was selected.
- •Participants received travel, accommodation, and a £420 fee to support inclusive participation.
- •Final Panel Composition: The final panel included 23 people. While not perfectly representative, the stratified random selection ensured diversity across key demographics.

### What did they learn?

- An independent Stewarding Board. Their expertise covered harm reduction, public health, criminal
  justice, law enforcement, recovery, lived experience and youth work.
- Help ensure that the process is conducted fairly, credibly, and transparently and that the information provided to the Panel is fair and balanced and of a high standard.

## What were the recommendations?: Collective Statement

#### Lack of implementation

"The panel strongly believe that the same conversations keep happening, with the same actions being agreed but not enough has been implemented. The panel recognise there has been some progress, for example naloxone programmes and safer drug consumption room implementation, however, this is not nearly enough action."

### Longer term Funding Communication and increased public awareness Importance of living and lived experience

### Time of implementation and planning

"The panel agree this is a public health emergency and directly affects large numbers of the population. The panel have concluded that the length of time taken to address this issue is unacceptable."



### What were the 19 recommendations?:

Rights & Lived Experience

- Human Rights Bill
- Anti-Stigma Training
- More (fairly paid) roles for lived experience in addiction workforce

Justice and Law Reform

- De-penalisation
- Increase drug courts
- Justice sector to refer to NHS & 3<sup>rd</sup> Sector support
- Parliamentary inquiry into drug harm in prisons

Treatment, care and support

- Single point of access for specialised advice
- Single shared assessments
- 5 year minimum funding
- MAT Standards equivalent for all drugs

**Prevention** 

- Drug education
- High tolerance approach
- Employability
- Avoiding 'cliff edge'
- Poverty
- Naloxone awareness



## What has the impact been so far?

- **Direct citizen testimony**: Panel participants gave evidence to committees on 20 Feb 2025.
- Immediate government response: Cabinet Secretary questioned directly after panel evidence.
- in Influenced parliamentary debate: Led to a dedicated Chamber debate on the report on 6<sup>th</sup> March 2025
- Strengthened scrutiny: Prompted further examination of government drug harm strategies and inquiry into drug harm in prisons
- Strengthened democratic participation: Parliament recognised and responded to public-led insights.
- So Model for inclusive scrutiny: Demonstrated how public input can drive timely, accountable action.





### What has the impact been so far?

**13 of 19 recommendations fully accepted** by the Scottish Government; 5 accepted in principle.

Human Rights Bill to be introduced next session; Charter of Rights published Dec 2024.

#### Support for lived experience workforce:

- Guiding Principles for employers.
- Employability Toolkits for career pathways.
- Workforce Knowledge & Skills Framework launched.

#### Justice reform:

- Exploration with courts on expanding drug courts.
- Criminal Justice Committee currently delivering inquiry into drug harm in prisons

### Improved information sharing:

• Legislation planned via National Care Service Bill (Part 2, Section 36).

#### Funding reform:

• Fairer Funding pilot with 2-year commitments for eligible organisations.



## What will happen next?

- Joint Committee to reconvene in Autumn to hear progress update from the Minister.
- Criminal Justice Committee inquiry into drug harm in prisons to report before session ends.
- Parliamentary business actively monitored to track further impact of Panel's recommendations.
- Sustained scrutiny: Ensures government accountability and continued focus on drug harm reduction led by public input.
